NOTES FROM THE SERVICE ON DECEMBER 24th. 2014

'What children and adults really want. It's cheaper than video games and healthier than icecream.

Bible reading: Luke 1: 67-80 The Prophecy of Zachariah- Becoming Strong in Spirit.

Key Points:

1. Luke 1: 67-80: 'to give knowledge of salvation'

- Salvation: to participate in God's life in the present moment, not just in heaven after we die; 'eternal life' is now. It means living in union with this eternal presence or Spirit which is characterized by the experiences of faith, hope and love. Love is correctly translated as "charity": 1 Corinthians 13.
- Paul the Apostle had a very here and now sense of 'eternal life': "behold whoever is in Christ is a new being, the old has passed away and the new has come." **2 Corinthians 5: 17**Paul saw that we could reach this state by trusting in God's love for us (as revealed through Christ)- a radical trust. He believed this was achievable through one's spiritual practices.
- The Christian triad/ triune for understanding God's life in the world is:

God 'the Creator': is power;

God the Son (Jesus): is purpose; and,

God the Holy Spirit: is presence.

- Biblical and modern day prophets are not fortune tellers. Rather, they humbly impart knowledge of salvation. By listening to God a prophet helps another to come alive by helping them to participate in that larger life of God's Spirit: faith, hope and love. This can be done in many ways, through advocacy and pastoral care for another, and by fighting for a world of justice and righteousness, bread and freedom. Check out how the early church/ apostolic community did this and laid down the example for all time: See Acts 2: 42-47: The Apostles spent time with God and with each other by working their spiritual practices (teaching, breaking bread, prayers, relationships of equality) and then they put their spiritual practices to work in acts of charity: 'they gave to any as had need.'

2. Ask: How do we do this in our family relationships?

- The family narrative or story is the result of healthy family relationships and interactions over a long period of time. Practice the things mentioned in **Acts 2: 42-47- notice the** *quality* **of those relationships**.
- Help your child and family to be aware of the **nurturing stories** at work in their lives (*the 'teaching' and learning*):
- Encourage contexts and patterns of relating to one another where nurturing stories can be further developed, where mutual honesty and respect of one another's feelings are practiced (*breaking bread together, talking, prayers*).

3. Luke 1: 67-80 "...to guide our feet into the way of peace...becoming strong in spirit"

- Help people be aware of the negative stories at work in their lives;
- Help them explore the unfolding stories that are positive;
- Provide your support so that the unfolding story can thicken to challenge the negative story.
- Your goal: to help your child or partner claim their sense of self in your presence, rather than being emotionally fused to you. Biblically this is what it means to 'become strong in Spirit'-connected to your deeper self which is God.

4. Key Points: 'What Children really want', Steve Biddulph

- A child wants to know if your marriage, your mental health, your faith, your affection and your discipline are strong enough.
- Then the child can relax and begin to grow.
- Babies, children, adults need: Love, contact and affection in its various forms.

Babies- human contact and affection:

- Skin to skin contact frequently;
- Movement of a gentle but robust kind; bouncing your child on knee;
- Eye contact, smiling, colourful, lively environment;
- Sounds such as singing, talking, etc.

Children:

- All adults and children need to be recognized, noticed and, preferably given sincere praise.
- Ask: Are you relaxed and happy enough to give others a secure feeling?
- Your words, your presence (active listening), your affection; your 'incarnational presence' shows faith, hope and love to another in your maturity and deeds: 'the word becomes flesh full of grace and truth' in you.

5. Why do children play up?

- They're bored: mental stimulation needed;
- They feel unwanted: can you spend a little time each day giving full, positive attention and physical contact to another?
- It gets them noticed: give attention for doing the *right* thing.

A DAY TO REMEMBER



Something momentous happened for one of our AVUC congregation on Monday 26 January 2015!

Our Sudanese friend Deborah became an Australian citizen – and Mike and I were able to join her husband James and their three children at Richmond Town Hall to see it happen.

It was a real multicultural occasion. A Vietnamese choir sang as we entered.

A local Elder welcomed us to Aboriginal country, the Mayor explained that his parents are Greek, an award was made for a Community Event organised jointly by Aboriginal people and others, and of the three Young Citizens of the Year, two were from Africa.

The 68 new citizens, from 25 different countries, pledged their "loyalty to Australia and its people, whose democratic beliefs I share, whose rights and liberties I respect, and whose laws I will uphold and obey". Cheers and tears, handshakes, hugs, photos and applause accompanied the presentation of citizenship certificates.

The Mayor's speech was balanced and thoughtful. He reminded us that, as well as the very many things we Australians have to be proud of, there are also many of which we should <u>not</u> be proud, and which we must aspire to change. The community of the City of Yarra (in which Deborah and James live) includes a significant population of Aborigines who make fine contributions to community life; but Australia's Indigenous people also suffer significant disadvantage, which we must find ways to overcome. He praised the co-operation and caring typical of our community here in Melbourne; but he also alluded to Australia's treatment of asylum seekers, asking that we encourage others to think, as Australians used to, of migrants as people who come to contribute to our society, not take from it. We must always remain vigilant against racism, however civilly or wittily expressed, because it has no place in our multicultural society, where except for Aboriginal people all of us are of migrant origin, and everyone has the right to be valued equally.

It was wonderful to see how overjoyed the 68 new citizens were, to become official Australians. And as I watched Amer and Yier dancing about bright-eyed, and darting off to share with each other the excitements of the hot-air hand-dryer in the wash-room, it seemed to me that here are some young Australians we are going to be very proud of in a few years' time.

Thinking of Deborah and James, and of Nasrin and Reza, Hamid and Marjan and Arshia, I am convinced that if people are fearful, scornful or hostile towards asylum seekers and refugees it is only because they have never had, or made, the opportunity to meet and talk with any. How lucky we are to be able to think, and tell others when the subject comes up in conversation, "I have friends who were refugees, and friends who are asylum seekers, and I am proud to know them"!

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THE POOR MAN'S CHRISTMAS TREE

You may have noticed signs appear recently on the entrance doors to AVUC, which read (in case you haven't had the chance to notice them!) as follows:

We welcome people of every age, gender, sexual preference, race, religion and political affiliation

We explicitly reject any form of prejudice or discrimination based on religion or race

ALL PEOPLE OF GOOD WILL ARE WELCOME HERE!

The signs were placed by the SEJC, with the approval of the Church Council, in response to a reported rise in verbal and physical attacks on people in Australia who are from overseas, in particular those that appear Middle Eastern or are thought to be Muslim. We believe you will want those who visit or use our church (such as Learningland and Kumon parents) to know that we accept and honour all people of any religion or none. We owe this, we believe, to Nasrin and her family, who honour us by being a part of our church community.

In response to a suggestion by one of our gardeners, SEJC members were able recently to initiate the collection of some free mulch from Moonee Valley Council, to spread round our beautiful garden so that it can be kept watered more effectively. Many thanks to Bob Muntz and Rev Ron, and specially to Michael Long, who borrowed a friend's trailer for the purpose, and did much of the hard work. More mulch will be needed, and any help in collecting or spreading it – in close consultation with our garden experts! – will be appreciated.

We are in the process of drawing up a tentative proposal to put to Church Council, that we install rainwater tanks, both as an environmental initiative and as a way for the church to minimise the cost of water usage. Your responses to this suggestion will be welcome!

Pancake Day - Shrove Tuesday February 17th

Believe it or not, but February is the most festive time of the year.

Why? Because of the carnivals happening world-wide! From Rio to Venice the festivities typically include lively parades, rich foods, and different forms of entertainment Many different theories surround the origins of Carnival. Some suggest that it is derived from the Latin expression "carne vale", which means "farewell to meat", signifying that those were the last days when one could eat meat before the fasting of Lent. The Mardi Gras parade in New Orleans is typical of the masquerades and dancing in the streets that take place in many countries on this day as people prepare for the long Lenten fast.



Shrove Tuesday is the last day before the long fast for the Lent period in many Christian churches. It has many names, including Fat Tuesday, Mardi Gras, the Tuesday of Carnival, and Pancake Day. The name Shrove Tuesday is derived from the Christian custom of confessing sins and being absolved just before Lent. Shrove Tuesday was traditionally a time to use up all the milk, butter and eggs left in the kitchen. These ingredients were often used to make pancakes, which is why the English call it Pancake Day. Others believe that the celebrations were a way to scare away evil spirits, thereby saying goodbye to winter and welcoming spring.

PREPARING FOR EASTER AND LENT

A Spiritual Exercise Plan for Lent and Beyond

Now that we're about two weeks into 2015, how's your resolution going? If you're like a lot of people, you made some kind of resolution to get into better shape this year. Maybe you started new diet. Maybe you signed up for a membership at your local gym. If you made a resolution like this, it's because you have a standard for your own well-being... a standard that you failed to live up to last year. Fortunately, when you hang the 2015 calendar on the wall, you get a fresh start. Every day is a new beginning. That's why the apostle Paul teaches that spiritual living is a daily struggle, similar to that of an athlete. We can't take time off and expect to stay in good shape. Every day, we have a responsibility to stay on top of it. We need to practice the spiritual disciplines of prayer, meditation, and worship. Prayer and meditation can go hand in hand with Bible reading. So how do you do that?

Public worship. Hearing God's word and receiving the sacrament is how God nourishes you spiritually. Its like putting petrol in your tank before you need it.

Prayer. God tells you to bring all your concerns to him. Prayer is a way to stay connected to God in a private and intimate way. The world is less stressful.

Personal devotion. Read a manageable portion of the Bible daily, or find a good devotional book to keep your mind on God every day. Many Christians find that the best time for this is early in the morning, when their minds are fresh. Read over the scripture, then ask yourself some questions: what is God saying to me? Is there a promise to claim? A sin to confess and forsake? A resolution to make? A truth to learn? Someone to help?

People. Talk to other Christians about faith and spirituality. Often you can learn more from a interpersonal dialogue that you can from solitary studying.

Being grateful – Remind yourself of everyone and everything in life you are grateful for.

Forgiveness: Give up anger and hate.

Do something unselfish every day.


